Robert Dixon Bewick, Jr. COL, EN, USAR (R)

Age 91, of Dover, DE departed this life on January 2, 2021.

Dick was born in Clarksburg, WV, the eldest son of the late Robert Dixon, Sr. and Catherine Arters Bewick. Dick graduated from Washington Irving High School in 1948, then West Virginia University in 1952, where he received a BS, in Civil Engineering. He received a commission as a 2nd Lieutenant in the U. S. Army Reserve and he married the late Jean Baker Bewick. They moved to Delaware, where he began his decades long career with the State Highway Department and the USAR.

Dick retired from the Delaware Department of Transportation in 1984 after serving as the Director of Highways/Chief Engineer. Dick was ultimately promoted to Colonel in the USAR. His penultimate position in the USAR was Commander, 390th Civil Affairs Group. He retired in 1991 from the USAR while serving with the 352ND Civil Affairs Command.

After retirement from DelDOT Dick worked in various capacities as an engineering consultant, both domestically and overseas. He returned to DelDOT in 1989 to serve as the first Deputy Secretary of Transportation. He also worked as a real estate appraiser in lower Delaware, after his government career. Dick served in multiple civic, political, and community organizations throughout his life.

Dick was a member of Christ Episcopal Church in Dover. He was preceded in death by his parents, his wife, and his brother, John Arters Bewick. He is survived by his daughter and son, Karen R.
