Dr. J. P. Comegys, World War Captain, Succumbs

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.-Dr. Joseph Parsons Comegys, who was post' surgeon of the .ock Island, Ill, arsenal during the World War, with the rank of captain, died yesterday at his home, 325 East Fifty-seventh street, New York, of pneumonia following three years of invalidism. He was born in Covington, Ky., sixty-nine years ago, a son of Cornelius P. Comegys, of Dover, Del., and a great-grandson of the Cornelius P. Comegys who was Gov-ernor of Delaware in 1838. His first American ancestor was Cornelius Comegys, who came from Lexmont, Holland, to Nieuw Amsterdam in 1654

After graduating from the Jefferson Medical College in 1891 Dr. Comegys practiced in Rock Island until he moved to New York after the armistice. He was a member of the American Medical Association, County Medical Society, Sons of the Revolution and the Holland Four daughters survive. Society. They are Miss Zelina de M. Comegys. Mrs. Theodore P. Peardon, Mrs. John C. Klum and Mrs. H. Howeil Bartlett.

Mrs. Zelina Brunschwig

Mrs. Zelina Comegys Brunschwig, a Rock Island native who became an internationally known fabric and wallpaper designer, died Sept. 10 in New York City. She was 84.

She was chairman of the board of Brunschwig Fils, a New York textiles firm known for its fabrics, wallpaper and art reproductions.

She grew up in Rock Island, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Joseph Comegys. Her father was a physician at Rock Island Arsenal.

After graduating from Rock Island High School, she began her career as a fabric designer in 1929. In 1938 she married Roger Brunschwig, whose family had been in the

textile business for 85 years. Mrs. Brunschwig in 1951 was awarded the Legion of Honor by France for her contributions to that nation during and after World War II.

Surviving are two sisters Mrs. Cornelia Bartlett and Mrs. Celeste Peardon.
