

I have been conferring with the Reverend Erik H. Allen, of Canden, who is making arrangements for the exhumation and reinterment of the bodies buried around St. Martin's Chapel, Hartly, which is now being sold.

Four grave spaces in all will be required for the burial in Christ Church Yard, in accordance with the Vestry's action in granting this space without charge for the purpose. Of the four, one is already manned for: in Lot 69 F&G purphased in 1950 by Mrs. Archie T. Mitchell for the burial of Mr. Rosengren, the second space will be used for the reinterment of the remains of Mrs. Rosengren.

I have made the following arrangements in regard to the other three spaces needed:

In Lot 70 Space EE there will be interred two urns containing ashes of members of the same family.

Referring to the Chart, Lot 53 shows a h-grave block marked A-B-C-D, and a single grave F, with the space which would have been G-H-I shown reserved relating.

I have arranged for the use of 53-F for the reinterment of a body which is already in a vault; and for the burial in what would have been 53-G of a small box (child's size coffin) containing what can be recovered of the remains of another family. It is highly unlikely that this grave, unmarked for many years and untended by any members of the family as far as can be discovered, will over have a marker, so that any planting made in this reserved space could come over this burial without hindrance.

If you will note for the present "Hartly Burials" in Lot 70-EE, Lot 53-F-0, I will get the family names to you later on. I do not think it would be necessary to issue a formal Permit. A notation in the Record should suffice, unless you think otherwise.
