HAVE MORNING WEDDING**

CEREMONY AT ST. PAUL'S

**Bridegroom Formerly in Air Service
of United States Army—Fifty
Guests Attend Ceremony**

The marriage of Miss Helen Scott Greenman of 217 Sterling street, this city, to Hubert L. Mott of Raymondville, formerly of this city, took place at St. Paul's Episcopal church at 8 this morning, Rev. Ernest C. Tutbill, rector of the church, officiated. About 50 guests were present.

As the bride entered the church on the arm of her brother, Miss Miriam Coulthart sang "Oh Perfect Love," with Miss Esther Ormsby playing the pipe organ. As the song ended Miss Ormsby played Lohengrin's wedding march. The bride was given away by her brother, Harold Greenman of Rochester. Miss Louise Bibbins was maid of honor and Roland H. Amos attended the bridegroom. Miss Mildred Reeves and Miss Clara Naughton acted as ushers. As the bridal party left the church Mendelssohn's wedding march was played.

The altar of the church was decorated with palms and asters. The bride was attired in a gown of dark blue georgette and charmeuse, with beads, and carried a shower bouquet. The maid of honor wore a gown of dark blue satin and carried pink asters. Both wore hats to match.

Mr. Mott and his bride are both well known young people of Watertown and have a wide circle of friends. Mr. Mott was formerly in the service and is now employed by the Remington Paper & Power company, Inc., at the Raymondville mill. The couple will reside in Raymondville.

The bride was born in Watertown, the daughter of the late Byron Scott Greenman and Carrie Vose Greenman, and Mr. Mott is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred T. Mott of Burrs Mills. Both are graduates of the Watertown High school, Mr. Mott in the class of 1916 and his bride in the class of 1915. The bride has been employed for the past three years by the Northern New York Trust company.

Mr. Mott was attending Wesleyan college at Middletown, Conn., in his second year when he left to enter the service. He enlisted in the aviation section and was sent to ground school at Boston. From there he was transferred to Dallas, Texas, and later to the flying field, Ebertsfield, Ark. He was undergoing flying instruction there when the armistice was signed and he was released, returning home last fall. For his war service he was awarded his degree by Wesleyan.

Out of town guests at the wedding were Mr. and Mrs. Harold Greenman of Rochester, Mr. and Mrs. George Greenman of Utica and Mrs. Frank Baltz of New York. Lieut. Commander William Greenman, U. S. N., a brother of the bride, who is now stationed in Washington, D. C., was unable to come to the wedding.
