


Gooden of Wilmington, a brother of the groom. The bride was prettily dressed in a gown of crepe de chene en train.

After the wedding, a reception was given to the numerous guests who were present at the marriage. Mr. and Mrs. Gooden left on the afternoon Norfolk express for Baltimore and Washington where they will enjoy their wedding trip in touring the National Capital and the Monumental city.
